Alan Mizeras Shares Valuable Resources With Members

The top 10 least desirable plants list was one of several valuable resources shared by Alan Mizeras, a volunteer plant rescuer for Henderson County, NC. He also gave each person present a copy of two books published in 2010 by the U.S. Forest Service: A Management Guide for Invasive Plants in Southern Forests and A Field Guide for the Identification of Invasive Plants in Southern Forests.

His top 10 list of least desirable plants included Oriental Bittersweet, Napalese Browntop, Chinese Privet, Multiflora Rose, Tree of Heaven,



Autumn Olive, English Ivy, Japanese Honeysuckle, Kudzu, and Chinese Wisteria. He also describes several other plants which may be on other least desirable lists. He described each with pictures and characteristics and gave us some valuable tips to manage or get rid of them.

SE-ARS President, Doley Bell, opened the combined meeting of SE-ARS and Vaseyi Chapter,



ASA, on April 17. He acknowledged the beautiful flowers brought by Ray Head, Marilyn Haynes, and Glenn O'Sheal. Ray announced that a

R. alabamense from Mobile, AL, given to some members a few years ago, is actually R. colemanii.

The members voted to approve half the funding for the reprinting of the Native Azaleas brochures for the NC Arboretum. John Brown gave a treasurers report, showing a current balance of \$859 in the SE-ARS checking account, including income of \$104.64 interest from the CD's, but indicated that the account will run close to the wire with upcoming expenses. The convention account has \$1500 in it, \$500 start up from each chapter and

\$500 from the sale of plants. Doley appointed Leon Pace and Don Haynes to serve on the nominating committee. Glenn O'Sheal gave the details for the flower show and had entry forms and gate passes available. Since things are blooming early this year, he encouraged the more northern members to be sure to bring trusses to make a good showing for the public.

Rich Becker brought a beautiful white evergreen azalea plant called Linwood Hardy Gardenia for a door prize. Joan McCord

was the proud recipient of this "Best in Show" winner from last year's flower show.

Hooper Bald is in western North Carolina, a short hike from the Cherohala Skyway west of Robbinsville, North Carolina. Hooper Bald has a unique collection of R.

calendulaceum growing in clumps of huckleberries, hawthorn trees and other shrubbery.

Spear-headed by Jim Brant, the Mid-Atlantic Chapter of the ARS started a project in 2007 to help the azaleas by cutting down and hauling out

many of the competing plants. Members of our chapter, the Azalea Chapter in Atlanta, and the Vaseyi Chapter of the ASA, have helped on this project.

This year, John Brown, Bob & Audrey Stelloh (who first met on Hooper Bald a year ago), and Tom Wright met with Jim Brant and George McLellan and began cutting brush on April 6. The next day, 14 members of the Sierra Club arrived, equipped with saws and loppers loaned by the U.S. Forest Service. After quick tutorials on how to distinguish

native azaleas from huckleberries (buds, bark, and branching habit), the Sierra Club volunteers went to work, and did more in two days than we had accomplished in the previous four years!

Two Garden Visits in Georgia by Marilyn Haynes

In mid April, your editor, Marilyn Haynes and husband, Don, took advantage of a unique opportunity to visit the gardens of two of our Associate members in north east Georgia. They were Ted Meredith and Joe Coleman.

We got just a glimpse of **Ted Meredith's garden** and Meredith Woodlands in last month's BRR which

really didn't prepare us much for what we were about to see. We met him at his lovely home, designed and superbly decorated by his late wife Sandy, with



gorgeous pristine formal gardens all around, in an upscale subdivision.



Then Ted drove us about 5 miles to the Meredith Woodlands, 13 acres of managed forest on a hillside. After issuing us walking sticks, Ted led us down the hill

and over the many paths near where hundreds (or maybe thousands) of native azaleas were growing

naturally. We saw where Ted had removed significant under story and trees to let more light in, leaving logs on the lower side of plants to hold the



natural mulch in place. There were many varieties of native azaleas of varying sizes, happily blooming. He had little flags

marking where there were tiny new azaleas coming up. It seemed miraculous! He admitted, however, to adding a few purchased hybrids to fill in here and there, plus a rhododendron or two. Early the next morning, we went to **Dr. Joe Coleman's garden**, where the azaleas were just a bit past peak bloom due to this year's early



spring. But there was still plenty of color!

Joe and Donna have lived on the property, bordered by two roads and a stream, for 30 years. They have

been collecting azaleas and rhododendrons all of that time, and there we were, in the midst of them at just the right season!



All the plants are labeled, and arranged in categories, by hybridizer, etc. Similar types are together so they can be compared.

Well maintained paths and steps lead around to various "rooms", each with another theme.



Occasionally we'd come across a tastefully placed concrete bench or pagoda, or some other decoration, with something gorgeously blooming nearby.

We got to our conference in Peachtree City fully renewed.
