May Brings International Convention to Asheville May 4-7

The convention planning committee met, with 17 people present, on Sunday, March 25, and worked out many of the final details for the convention. The Sat. and Sun. tours being longer than expected may cause some minor schedule changes. There will be a third bus for the Mon. Bonus Tour, one will leave at 8:00 AM and two at 9:00 AM. A sign up sheet will be at the registration desk for those who wish the 8:00 AM tour.

Our registrars reported that 440 people had registered, and John still had some more. Nearly every event and tour is wait listed more than they thought. An additional bus may be added to each tour to accommodate everyone, if possible. Registrations are now closed. Audrey Stelloh is keeping track of all the workers and their schedules, to be sure every task is covered when needed. The pre-convention mailing is nearly ready to go out to all registrants soon.

The plant sale will be fantastic with some very special, hard to find plants! However, we will not have phytocertificates due to lack of interest in paying the extremely high cost for them. Forty Oaks Farm Garden, in Campobello, SC. Sunday April 15, from 2:00 to 5:00 PM. Betty writes Ray Head's garden, Rutherfordton, NC, is about a a biweekly gardening column for the Spartanburg Herald 10 acre collection of plants, mainly hollies, native Journal, and sometimes writes for the Spartanburg Magazine and other publications.

The garden contains many azaleas as well as many rare and unusual trees and shrubs. Some of the items usually in bloom mid-April are: Dogwood, Camellias, Native Azaleas, Viburnum, Evergreen Azaleas, Lily of the Valley, 'White' Red Bud, tulips, Chinese Retusus, Kerria, Edgeworthia, Spirea, Dec. magnolia.

Of the Evergreen azaleas that should be in flower in mid-April are Coral Bells, Hardy Gardenia, Hampton Beauty, GG Gerbing, Formosa, Pink Ruffles, George Lindley Tabor, Summerville, plus others.

McCarter Garden, Travelers Rest, SC, is the home of Pamela and Dr. Jackson McCarter, a semi retired pathologist and avid gardener. A stone main residence is nestled in the forest with other areas including cottages and outbuildings from an earlier country ham farm. This is a natural, informal "garden" in a very hilly setting beneath towering hardwoods, in approximately eight acres of planted area surrounded by 120 acres of natural woodland with walking trails. The effect is that rhododendrons and azaleas appear to have "just grown there". Places to relax include a lakeside gazebo, a garden gazebo and decks. Rhodomania onset was in the early 1970's. Emphasis is on rhododendron species, some hybrids selected for heat and drought tolerance, and American and Japanese native azaleas.

Rhododendron species include mature mass plantings of predominantly R. degronianum ("yak" and "metternichii"), R. hyperythrum, and R. fortunei/ decorum. Other features include an extensive seedling nursery with a solar greenhouse. Be prepared for a good stroll, with sturdy footwear.

We're invited to come any time on Sunday April 15. They're about 30 minutes from Forty Oaks Farm.

azaleas, camellias and lepidote rhododendrons, plus many evergreen azaleas and eleipode rhododendrons that represent the hardiest of these groups. Ray also has a collection of native trees, shrubs, and wild flowers from the southeastern states, some of which are rare plants. Practically everything was grown from cuttings or seed.

Garren Garden, Travelers Rest, SC, is the home of one of the Southeast's leading horticulturists, William R. Garren. Bill is a retired nurseryman and the former Director of Horticulture at the Biltmore Estate. He was at Biltmore in the 50's, when the Dexter committee was formed by John Wister and visited Biltmore to check the validity of Charles Dexter's work. Although that committee found nothing of interest there, their efforts were rewarded with 141 named hybrids. Bill made it his personal goal to acquire all 141 named Dexter hybrids for his property! And of course he achieved it. He hires some gardening to be done, now, but he says "Mother Nature is my number one gardener."

Bill and his wife, Pat, have invited us to come on Tuesday, April 24, any time after 1:00 PM.
