Christmas Event at Research Station with Dr. Anthony LeBude Saturday, December 7, 11:00 AM

Our December Christmas Event will be a special treat at the Fletcher Research station: Anthony Lebude, Associate Professor, Nursery Crops and

Extension Research, has invited us to the Mountain Horticultural Crops Research and Extension Center in Fletcher, to view and rate the hollies planted there. He says the hollies look the best they have ever looked since being planted!



We will meet at 11:00 AM at the Research Station. Bring a sandwich and your favorite Christmas cookies to share. There is a room inside where we can set up everything to get warm while we go into the landscape, etc. and we will eat afterwards.

"We are just going to tour a replicated planting of hollies here on the station, then rate them for overall shape, color, berry quality, and winter damage.... nothing more than walking through them and giving them some sort of numerical score." Anthony tells us. "If it's cold, we are not going to stay out long. We can make a decision on that day."



"The plants are on a hill with at least a 2-3% slope; however, we can drive almost to them with little walking. This just let's people know that it might be mildly strenuous but nothing they cannot handle," Anthony explained.

The Mountain Horticultural Crops Research and Extension Center (MHCR&EC) is located at 455 Research Drive in Mills River, North Carolina, about halfway between Asheville and Hendersonville.

DECEMBER PROGRAM ON HOLLIES-Part 1

Together with deciduous trees and shrubs, the genus *Ilex* offers important companions for the rhododendron garden. There are many species and varieties available in the genus *Ilex*. Our visit to the Fletcher Experiment Station is an introduction to work currently under way locally.

In our quest for year round color in our rhododendron and azalea plantings - especially during late fall/winter/earliest spring - hollies not only add structure to the garden but color, lots of it. But they can add so much more than substance in the shrub and tree layer – they can be used in groups to separate clashing colors in azalea and *(Continued on page 3)*

tolerance, disease and insect resistance. He uses R. Hyperythrum in all his crosses for both the seed and pollen parent. His crosses include Cee Cee, Papa Cook and several yet to be named.



Glen O'Sheal handled the plants for Members. We only

had 100 plants from the 300 cuttings this year. J. Jackson and Lindy Johnson of Appalachian Native Plants donated an additional 30 plants. **Thank you J. and Lindy!!!** Everyone went home happy.

Hollies: (*Continued from page 1*) rhododendron plantings and they can be foreground or background as well.

Ranging in size from just 8-10" high up to 25 ft. and more, from a few feet wide to massive 20 ft. spreads, a holly can be found to fill just about any space. Shapes



vary from fat or skinny pyramids to flat or rounded low mounds. Both evergreen and deciduous species are available - with variegated foliage in gold or white, shiny or dull leaves with spiny or smooth edges. Berry colors range from red to orange, to yellow and near cream and even insignificant black.

We will follow this program late next fall with another one covering the many available holly varieties. In the meantime, keep your eyes open for hollies available at local nurseries. For further reading visit the web site of the Holly Society of America. I suggest the following for reading: HOLLIES FOR GARDENERS by Christopher Bailes, and RHODODENDRONS IN THE LANDSCAPE by Sonja Nelson.
